TS-24 UNLOCKING THE VALUE OF PROXIMITY: POST-PANDEMIC URBAN POLICIES AND THE PROXIMITY ECONOMY ECOSYSTEMS

Keywords: Proximity Economy Ecosystems; Neighbourhoods; Innovation; Urban Policies; 15-Minute City.

The post-pandemic landscape has ignited a critical reassessment of urban policies, with the European Union and national governments increasingly focusing on regional development anchored in local strengths. This session scrutinizes the pivotal role of the proximity economy ecosystems in redefining urban policy strategies. The session tackles the territorial and spatial facets of the proximity concept, elucidating how it is instrumental in enhancing economic, social, and environmental innovation at a neighbourhood scale. At this precise scale, proximity-based value chains emerge, delivering economic, social, and environmental dividends to producers, consumers, and the community at large. Proximity-oriented urban landscapes encompass not only the reinvigoration of public spaces for community-driven and co-produced activities but also the revitalization of private spaces by establishing local businesses, artisans, and personal service providers. These initiatives collectively reshape the neighbourhood's identity and are aimed - at least in theory - at fostering a sense of just and sustainable urban development. This session delves into the role of the proximity economy in shaping urban development in the post-pandemic era. By recognizing the added value of proximity, the session aims to foster a comprehensive understanding of the proximity economy's multifaceted role in shaping the future of urban planning and spatial revitalization.
